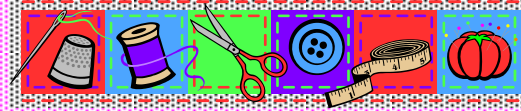


Context

Jesus is journeying towards Jerusalem (Lk 9:51 – Jesus sets his face towards Jerusalem). The tax collectors and sinners have come to listen to Jesus, and the Pharisees are grumbling because Jesus welcomes sinners and eats with them. The tax collectors were despised because they were Jews who collected taxes for Rome and who made a great profit in doing so. Sinners were rejected by the Pharisees because they were unclean; they did not (and in many cases could not) obey the rituals and purity laws of the Jewish faith. The Pharisees represented one branch of Judaism which emphasized the ritual and purity laws of Moses. They are often characterized in the New Testament as self-righteous, hard-hearted, and always trying to trick Jesus. We need to keep in mind that this is just a characterization and is not descriptive of every Pharisee or Jew, most of whom faithfully sought to obey God and worship him. One complaint that the Pharisee held against Jesus was that if Jesus is a holy man, he would not have associated with sinners and tax collectors, for then he, too, would be unclean.

Jesus tells this parable in response to the Pharisees' grumbling. The shepherd in Jesus' day was a lowly, second-class citizen, but he cares for his sheep. If just one sheep is lost, he will leave the other 99 in the dangerous wilderness to go searching for the lost sheep. When the shepherd finds the sheep, he carries it on his shoulders and rejoices. He throws a party!

Activity



Conduct a Scavenger Hunt that you design. Have students search for hidden "sheep" using riddle clues.

You may want to have the class prepare the scavenger hunt and invite the families to become the hunters.

OR

Have students put together a jigsaw puzzle (unaware that you are withholding one piece). When they have finished except for the "lost" piece, ask participants to talk about how they feel when one piece is missing. Make the analogy that we are pieces of the body of Christ. How does God feel when we are missing from the "picture"?

Have you ever been lost? What happened? How did you feel when you were found?

Have you ever lost something special to you? How did you feel? Did you find it?

Who is Jesus speaking to? How do they respond to Him? What does the shepherd in the parable do? What happens when he finds the sheep?

What are some of the ways we stray from Jesus? What does this parable tell us about Jesus? (He loves us even when we mess up and He is out looking for us. We can't push God away, no matter how bad we are).

Who are the "sinners and tax collectors" today? What does this parable say about them? How should we respond?



Sending

At home, talk about how it feels when one of the family is missing from the dinner table. Retell the Lost Sheep parable to your family.
