### Music



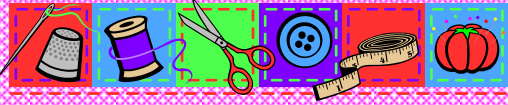

## Activity



Think of what you could/would do if you won \$10,000. Talk with your family and friends and ask them the same question. Then, in light of this lesson, will anyone change their choices?

## Context



Thousands have gathered to hear Jesus, but He first speaks to his disciples, teaching them about values. He uses a scenario that many long to live – having such abundance that you cannot contain it all in your barns. Consider looking at Ecclesiastes 1 and Malachi 3: 8-10a to further your thoughts on this parable.

What did the rich man do when he discovered that he had no place to store his abundance? Was that a wise decision? What happened to him that very night?

What do you value most?

Before making decisions, do you consult others? God?

The Rich Fool said “**I** will” four times – What does that say to you?

When you depart this earth, what will you take with you? What will you leave for others? To whom will you leave it?

What do you want others to remember about you when you are gone?

## Sending



Consider this downsizing idea of cleaning your closet and sorting seldom used items into three boxes: one is to be given to charity, one is to be tossed away, and one is to be stored for one year. If at the end of the year, you have not needed those items, you are to give them away. Then, when you purchase an item, you give something else away.
